

GOLDEN HIND MUSEUM SHIP BRIXHAM

SAFETY & HAZARD INFORMATION PLEASE NOTE: THIS IS NOT A RISK ASSESSMENT

Teachers and organisers should follow DfE guidelines and complete their own risk assessment. The purpose of this information is to provide as much detail as possible to help organisers to ensure that they are satisfied that the Golden Hind (GH) is suitable for their group, and to help them to identify the steps that they should take in preparation for their visit.

The GH is a full-size replica ship with uneven decks, low and small doorways and in some areas, low level, atmospheric lighting. We endeavour to make the GH as safe as possible whilst offering visitors an opportunity to experience life in the days of Tudor England & Pirates. This information in line with good practice, aims to highlight the things that can happen on board, albeit rarely, if at all, and the steps that GH have taken to minimise risks for visitors to the ship.

GENERAL SAFETY MEASURES

Organisers are welcome and encouraged to make a planning pre-visit (at no charge) to discuss the aims of the visit and assess the ship before bringing the group on board.

Organisers are responsible for ensuring that there are enough helpers. Students should be supervised in line with recommended ratios. We suggest one adult for every 6 students. Helpers must know who is in their group and that they are responsible at all times for supervising their students whilst embarking, on board and disembarking the ship. Organisers can use the website to familiarize themselves with the ship and its location, before the visit.

The supervision, welfare and behaviour of students are the responsibility of the organisers. It is expected that the Group 2 Leader is aware of any specific medical needs and/or behavioural and emotional difficulties of group members. Organisers should advise the GH of any special Educational Needs in advance of their visit to help ensure these needs are met.

Naturally students will be excited. It is important that everyone has an enjoyable and safe visit to the GH and it is the organiser's responsibility to ensure that staff and students are fully briefed on the content of their risk assessment prior to the visit. To assist in this and help with the pre-brief of the group the ship's 'Golden Rules' are listed below:

Students under the age of 16 must be supervised at all times

No running – 'walk only'

No climbing or pulling any ropes, rigging, cords or chains

No hanging over the sides of the ship or climbing onto the edges of the ship

Take care when moving around decks especially, if the decks are wet under foot

Wear suitable footwear at all times - flat soled rubber fully enclosed shoes are recommended

Mobile phones should only be used in an emergency

No eating or drinking on board

Observe safety signage and ascend and descend steep staircases like a ladder as indicated onboard (ie facing the stair).

Brixham is a working harbour	Entering the water All visitors	Railings run around most of the harbour edge, care should be taken at all times There is a life buoy in the old market place area adjacent to the ship	School to brief students on water safety prior to visit
Falling off the ship	Entering the water All visitors	The gunnels (balustrades) of the ship are at heights to prevent people falling over board if they trip on deck Strict 'no climbing or sitting on gunnels' policy 'Man overboard' procedure whereby staff once aware of an incident will throw a line to the person in the water and call 999 for assistance. Students should be supervised by school organisers at all times and should observe the safety guidelines provided by ship staff and around the ship
Gangplank - height varies depending upon water levels in the harbour. The ship is fully mobile some natural movement due to the water levels changing continuously can be expected	Trips, slips, falls Queasiness due to movement All visitors and staff	The gangplank has solid timber handrails and guard rails which should be used at all times and particularly at high tide, when the gang plank is at a steeper angle. The gangway planking has treads for improved grip and is coated with non-slip paint. Safety netting is attached and cargo safety net runs under the gangplank. The immediate step off area from the gangplank to board the ship is an area of non-slip. Staff will be on hand to assist as may be required with embarkation/ disembarkation If an organizer requests early disembarkation of a student, this can be arranged with the staff on board	Students must be supervised by school organisers at all times during embarkation and disembarkation Students must be briefed about the ship's natural movement on the tides as part of their pre-briefing
Students wandering off the ship	Separation from the group All students	The gangplank metal high gate can be closed at the request of the school but for safety reasons cannot be locked or fixed shut when the ship is occupied	Students must be supervised by school organisers at all times

		Fire alarms are fitted throughout the ship An evacuation procedure in place Fire extinguisher provision is assessed, provided and annually serviced by Devon & Cornwall Fire Protection Ltd. Extinguishers are situated and labelled throughout the ship	Any suspicious activities, people or parcels must be reported to staff by visitors immediately
Low atmospheric lighting	Trips, falls All visitors and staff	No areas are in total darkness Display and floor lighting is adequate, akin to 'shipboard life' Emergency lighting illuminates the direction of the exit in the event of a power failure Emergency lighting units are checked regularly and maintained	Students must be supervised and made aware prior to visit
Climbing ropes/rigging	Fall/injury All visitors	Clear signs are displayed stating that climbing of the rigging is strictly prohibited. Loss of belongings	All visitors	Baggage and personal belongings remains with visitors at all times Lost property can be reported to a member of staff Found property can be handed in to a member of staff	Students must take care of their belongings at all times when onboard Organisers must limit the valuables that students bring on their visit in line with normal school rules

All visitors enter the Golden Hind at their own risk and are advised to take particular care when warnings and signs are displayed. All under 16's must be supervised by adults and it is the responsibility of those adults to ensure appropriate care is taken by the minor. The Golden Hind will not be responsible for visitors for any accident happening or injury suffered by them or damage to or loss of any personal possessions whilst visiting the Golden Hind in Brixham.

CCTV is in operation on selected areas of the ship for the safety of visitors and by boarding the ship, visitors agree to being filmed whilst on board. Golden Hind staff may refuse to permit boarding to any person(s) whom they deem unfit to access the ship and have the right to request anyone to leave the ship, if their behaviour is disruptive to others or an unacceptable risk to the crew or visitors.
